Call to Order by Laura

Carrying over minutes from Nov:

2020 Total available funds for expenditures \$2,854.

Motions Approved

Kathleen motioned to approve minutes from November, 2020 meeting. Russell seconded.

Nall: Parks Committee voted unanimously to recommend to Council the Girl Scouts' Silver Award project, a Gaga Ball Pit that they will fund, build and install in Nall Park.

R Park: Committee voted unanimously to post signage prohibiting skateboarding in the Davis Pavilion and in the tennis courts. Sign shall state the ordinance and amount of fine.

R Park: Committee voted to only place four picnic tables in pavilion during Covid-19 pandemic. The thought behind this was to promote outdoor distancing.

Sweany: Committee voted to approve \$2,000 for Sweany Park landscape refreshment in 2021.

Committee voted to recommend Jamie Davis and Sarah Martin to Mayor Kelly to be members of Parks Committee.

Committee unanimously approved \$109.20 for lunch for Public Works.

Presentations and Proposals:

-Girl Scouts presented their final Cadette Silver Award project, a Gaga Ball pit in Nall Park.

Completed Action Items

Cooper Creek: Volunteers completed Winter Creeper eradication.

Cooper Creek: "River Totems" sculptures were installed.

R Park: Four trees replaced by Mega Construction and City covered 50% of cost.

Sweany: Bench design ("Reading") chosen; Sending to Council for approval.

Roe House objective cancelled by City Council.

Tree marker process and documents transferred from Kathleen to Russell.

Linda Thornburg Committee recommendation forwarded to Mayor Kelly.

Nall Park: Tony to schedule arborist tree evaluation and mapping, variety identification and health assessment.

Nall Park: Tony continues with SW corner project.

Nall Park: Spring 2021 spruce up landscaping.

Nall Park: Tony to order No Littering sign.

Nall Park: Girl Scouts to install Gaga Ball Pit in Spring 2021.

R Park: City funded tree replacement-Spring 2021. Replacement of trees the city opted to lose on the North side of R Park: Laura and Russel will address replacing trees and tree markers in Spring 2021. Donnie said there is budget money.

R Park: Committee decided to leave pavilion picnic tables unbolted for now. Spacing and orientation of picnic tables in pavilion to be determined on site

R Park: Committee voted unanimously in support of signage prohibiting skateboarding in the Pavilion and in the tennis courts.

R Park: install 4 picnic tables. PW

R Park: Tony is finding out about the need for a fire extinguisher in the pavilion.

R Park: Tony found that fire department has no issue with bollards being placed in hammerhead. Tony to order bollards.

R Park: Tony to present color selection for swing sets and basketball goal poles.

R Park: Tony is tracking vendors for fireplace screen

R Park: Tony, Laura, and Jayme to meet and discuss dangerous sidewalk issue at Briar hammerhead/storm drain.

Sweany Park: small play structure: Tony to attempt a different vendor due to no response.

Sweany Park: Bench style was chosen by committee. Will be ordered. Tony.

Sweany: Tony to send tree donation information and form to Anita

Roe 2020 trees: Parks Committee needs an update on Roe 2020 trees: Inventory, health, preventive treatment. Markers? Laura

We will push Bridge the Gap Foundation and Contain the Rain JoCo resources to community. Presentation in new year?

Written guidance for new committee members. Laura and Russell by end of year.

Weed treatment policy: Tony will provide committee his presentation by Monday, Dec. 14. Will present to Council in December a plan for traditional weed treatment to protect our investment in R Park and other parks. Committee agreed that Nall would remain herbicide-free. Committee urges City to use weed treatment, fertilizer, and overseeding until good turf is established.

Laura and Tony will work to incorporate Arbor Master's tree inventory for a tree replacement schedule for entire Park system. Budget to be established.

Tony to check with Donnie to see if he has a plan for Adopt an Island. Laura to give project new energy. Recruitment for a Committee member to represent Ward 2 still underway. Four applications have been submitted representing other three wards.

Purpose

To objectively assess citizen satisfaction with the delivery of major City services


To measure trends from previous surveys

To compare the City's performance with residents regionally and nationally

To help determine priorities for the community

Overall Satisfaction Index 2008 - 2019

Derived from the mean overall satisfaction rating provided by residents Year 2008=100



The Overall Satisfaction Index has increased over the last two surveys, we hope to see the same in 2021

Methodology

Survey Description

- This will be the 4th Community Survey conducted for the City by ETC Institute
- Include many of the same questions to ensure trends are maintained
- Add new questions to address priorities and current issues

Method of Administration

- By mail and online to all households in the City
- Each survey will take approximately 15-20 minutes to complete

Sample Size

- 2019: Goal was 400 surveys; 604 surveys were completed; MOE +/- 4% at the 95% level of confidence
- 2021: Goal will be 400 completed surveys, we will deliver results above and beyond the goal at no additional charge to the City

2019 Survey Highlights



• Items were found to be high priorities based on 2019 Importance-Satisfaction Analysis

Green

- Key questions that should be kept in 2021 survey
- Some questions should receive additional items, some should receive additional emphasis questions

Cyan

Questions 2019 results may have resolved, should be reviewed before including in 2021 (Q24)

Yellow

Hyper-specific questions – first to cut for additions in 2021

2019 Survey Highlights

Questions highlighted in yellow were very specific to a topic that the City was working on

- Leaf program
- Smoke free programs
- Aquatics center
- Taxes and fees
- Nall Park
- Tear Down and Rebuilds
- Single family home designs and universal design standards

Other questions like Q24 – Community Investment Areas should be reviewed and edited to reflect 2021 areas

• We will also want to refine these options and remove the items that were least supported





Tear Downs/Rebuilds & Universal Design Standards

60% supported increasing the City authority to regulate design aesthetics in homes in RP

16% were neutral

25% did not support the idea

Universal Design Standards


38% supported increasing City authority to incorporate Universal Design Standards


21% were neutral

Aquatic Center Questions

Adding shade structures and umbrellas and replacing deck furniture among most important changes to residents

There was not a consensus among residents on the funding options


37%: The City keep the property tax mill levy at the current level, using the revenue to pay for changes at the pool


20%: The City lower the mill levy 2 mill, a savings of \$50.00/yr. on a \$200k home, and not make changes to the pool

9%: The City issue debt to pay for changes at the pool and use a portion of the current mill levy to repay that debt




Smoke Free Roeland Park

72% supported the initiative

11% did not support a smoke free ordinance/rule




Leaf Program

19% were neutral




Nall Park

Addressing Priorities

We should continue to ask the same questions to ensure we have adequately address past priorities

Although services still may be high priorities in 2021, we want to see an improvement to the overall satisfaction rating

We should add the "EMPAHSIS" question to the City Maintenance category to better understand City maintenance issues as it relates to the 2nd priority from 2019: maintenance of city streets, buildings, and facilities.

Adding additional "EMPHASIS" questions to other key service areas (i.e., Transportation and Connectivity, Trash Issues, and City Communication) can help us better prioritize services in 2021 and beyond

New Questions to Consider

2020 has brought new challenges to municipal governments across the country

New survey topics to consider include:

- Social and racial equity
- Police bias
- Racism
- Tax/fee increases/changes
- Health and wellness
- Other social issues
- Additional initiatives and pertinent topics that will help you make better decisions in 2021 and beyond

We will want to weigh the importance of benchmarking past results with asking new questions

New Questions to Consider

It is important to ask questions that are directly related to problems the City can help address

We want to ensure that questions are not hyper-specific to certain situations

We will want to ensure we are mindful of the community as a whole when developing special interest questions

Sample Questions: Social Equity

Satisfaction with:

- Attitude and behavior of police officers towards residents in your neighborhood
- Professionalism of police officers
- Police safety education programs
- Efforts to cooperate with the public to address concerns
- Overall appearance and quality of police vehicles and equipment
- Quality of dispatch (911) services
- The treatment of minority families in RP

Agreement with:

- The RP PD is trying to maintain good relations with the community
- RP PD does a good job enforcing the law
- I am confident in RP PD's ability to utilize good judgement in the use of force
- I am confident RP PD's officers have receive appropriate training on how to handle confrontations
- RP PD personnel treat residents of different races/ethnicities equally

Sample Questions: Fee Increase/Changes

- Ensure the question is straightforward and easy to understand
- Describe the individual impact of the change
 - How will this impact the respondent personally
- Develop multiple choice responses
 - Very supportive, supportive, not supportive, not at all supportive
- Get a better understanding of why respondents chose "not supportive" responses
 - I need more information before I can make a decision
 - I do not want to see any increase to taxes/fees
 - Other options
 - Open ended options

Custom Questions for Roeland Park

We want to ensure questions are aimed at the community as a whole

ETC Institute will work with the City to ensure any custom questions that are specifically related to community needs and interests are included

The best data is collected when we have robust sample sizes

Next Steps

SURVEY DEVELOPMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

Survey Development

ETC Institute will utilize feedback to create an updated 1st draft of 2021 survey instrument

Staff and Council will review 1st draft and compile suggested changes/edits

ETC Institute will continue to edit survey instrument until Staff and Council are in agreement and grant final approval

Once final approval is granted, ETC Institute will develop the online survey and perform a final proof/test of the survey instrument

We will update the cover letter for 2021, and deliver a final version of the 2021 survey for final review before printing

Survey Administration

Once surveys are printed, they should begin arriving in mailboxes within 10 business days (sooner based on ETC Institute's proximity to Roeland Park)

We will aim to mail the surveys June 14, 2021

Administration takes approximately 4 weeks once surveys arrive (completed by end of July)

Surveys will be mailed to ALL residential addresses within the City

We will continue to track responses until reaching our goal

If surveys continue to arrive after reaching our goal, we will complete data entry and include them in the final database

A draft report will be delivered to the City approximately two weeks after finalizing the database
